The Campus Vision 2050 does recognize UBC Farm, but it may not be accessible to many students, allowing a finer-grain infiltration of micro urban agricultural areas will help bring the agricultural uses to where students already congregate. 	Consider referencing "night-time safety while reducing light impacts on climate and ecology in this section," similar to policy 4.5.7.2.	Regional Parks
4.4.1.4	Consider referencing green edges to protect environmental values from urban development within the Point Grey campus. Including protective actions from excessive sound and light would be beneficial to maintaining regional park natural values.	Regional Parks
4.4.1.6	Along with planning for green infrastructure and nature-based solutions, consider setting permeability or rainwater capture targets (e.g. capture and treat 90% of average annual rainfall on campus).	Regional Planning
4.4.1.9	Consider identifying the tools UBC is planning to use for assessing, acquiring, and securing ecological buffers, and defining the required or recommended buffer widths.	Regional Planning

4.5.4	Consider adding 'and within' to the section description to read "single occupancy vehicle trips to, from and within UBC Point Grey campus."	Regional Planning
4.5.4.3	Consider expanding this policy to include residents. TransLink has a new Compass for Developments program that could be referenced.	Regional Planning
4.5.4.4	Consider including a similar policy focusing on resident parking in addition to commuter parking.	Regional Planning
